Important Instructions regarding filling up of online application(s) form(s):

1. Applicant(s) are required to apply online through Govt. Degree College Sarahan Dist. Sirmaur, H.P. official website i.e <https://gcsarahan.edu.in/>. No other means/modes of application are acceptable.
2. Applicant(s) must have a valid Email ID and Mobile Number before registering and creating login credentials.
3. Applicant(s) must verify the email before logging in. It is a onetime process.
4. Verification mail may reflect in inbox or spam folder of the email account holder.
5. After creating login credentials, applicant(s) need to login with these credentials. He/she will be redirected to dashboard page, from where he/ she can apply for the relevant course.
6. Applicant(s) need to click on 'Click Here to Apply' link, to apply for the Course.
7. Applicant(s) should carefully fill all the information asked in the Form and then SAVE it.
8. The Applicant(s) is required to upload at the appropriate web links provided for that purpose:
  - Matriculation or Date of Birth Certificate, in support of his date of birth/proof of age.
  - 10+2 mark sheet for merit generation.
  - Character certificate (issued by the competent authority).
  - Migration certificate (for students belonging to boards other than HP)
  - The category certificates for claiming reservation, fees relaxation, age relaxation etc. against their respective category, they do belong to. ❖Size of documents should not exceed 1 MB.
9. The Applicant(s) is also required to upload his/her recent photograph image. Size of the photograph (passport size) should not exceed 50 KB. (Ht. X Wd. =4.5 X 3.5 cm).
10. Only the applications of applicants who fulfil all the requisite eligibility criteria will be accepted by the system.
11. Applicant(s) will not be allowed to edit their application form after its final submission.

## **FEE STRUCTURE AND MODE OF PAYMENT**

The fees of all type prescribed for the Applicant(s) are mentioned in prospectus. **However, the Applicant(s) are required to follow below mentioned procedure to pay the fees:-**

- After submitting application, 'Pay prospectus fee' link will be visible in the second grid of dashboard page.
- Applicant(s) will be able to see applications submitted by them in the application status grid with fees payment (prospectus fees) status.
- 'Pay prospectus fee' link will be available there only for those applicants for which the prospectus fees is not paid.
- Only one option will be available after clicking on Pay Now link for prospectus.
- Online Payment: Applicant(s) can pay using Net banking, UPI (Google Pay, PhonePe, Paytm, Bhim etc) for Online Payment to the college.
- No payment will be accepted after the last date of submission of application form as mentioned in notification. The candidature of such Applicant(s) shall be liable to be rejected straightway without further communication.

### **General Instructions:**

- Before filling up the online application form, the Applicant(s) are advised to read carefully the Notification/Advertisement for the courses (s)/Exam(s) and also ensure that he/she is eligible as per the criteria as prescribed in the Advertisement Notice.
- The applications received through any other mode (offline etc.) will not be accepted.
- Online Application process must be completed (including Form Filling and submit Prospectus Fee) before last date fixed for submission of online form as mentioned in the Notification/Advertisement, after which the web link will automatically be disabled and no subsequent correspondence will be entertained in that respect.

## ABOUT COLLEGE AND THE PLACE

Govt. Degree College Sarahan is a new institution that was opened in June, 2014 by the Government of Himachal Pradesh with the sole objective of providing adequate opportunity of academic and intellectual growth to the youngsters residing in the far flung areas of the Pachhad region of district Sirmaur. It is located at a distance of 38 km from district headquarters Nahan on the one side and 52 km from Solan, on the other side.

As per the local narratives about the origin of the name of this place (Sarahan) there are very interesting versions. The first version says that this place derives its name from the only perennial source of water which is a huge pond. In local dialect, the word SAR means the water body (pond) and RAHAN means the habitation, meaning thereby the habitation of human beings surrounding the water body. There is a religious story about how this pond came into existence. Once upon a time when SHIRGUL, the local deity, was feeling very thirsty then his GOD SISTER BHANGAYANI (a famous deity in Sirmaur district) thumped her feet on earth and the water spurted out of that place which eventually formed the large pond. The shape of the pond resembles the footprint.

Another version states that in olden times when king used to happen on journey along with his subordinates he used to halt at this place. It is stated that there was a SARAI (a guest house) near this village where the king and his companions used to stay. That is how the place acquired its present name as SARAHAN means a place which has a SARAI.

The place SARAHAN is situated in Tehsil Pachhad on a dry hill of Dhaarti region with the highest peak of BHUR SINGH-KI-DHAR (1961 m) lying towards south of Churdhar mountain. It takes its origin from Dagshai in the west, and runs parallel to Saindhaar extending to Giri river near Sirmauri Tal. In the winter season the hill receives snow which sometimes stays up to February. On its top is a temple, dedicated to a deity named BHUR SINGH, from where the hill derives its name.

### **Co-Curricular Activities and Facilities Available:**

#### **Cultural and Academic Societies**

- 1) Red Ribbon Club (RRC):** In order to raise awareness levels regarding the dreaded AIDS and Drug Abuse, the college institutionalized Red Ribbon Club of 50 volunteers comprising 25 boys and 25 girls in every session.

- 2) **Eco- Club:** Eco Club plays an important role in creating environmental awareness among the students. College has formed Eco- Club to educate students about the environment and to create a clean and green consciousness among students through various innovative methods.
- 3) **NSS:** With the objective to inculcate the sense of social responsibility among students the college has an NSS Unit of 100 volunteers. The students are advised to contact NSS Programme officer for the enrolment and other details.
- 4) **NCC:** From the academic session 2025-26, NCC (Senior Division (SD) for boys and Senior Wing (SW) for girls) have been started. NCC inculcates Unity and Discipline and fosters leadership, teamwork, and a feeling of patriotism among the students. The college has an NCC unit with authorization of 2 Platoons i.e. 106 seats. At present, college has 35 cadets and each year new cadets will be recruited to fill up the seats. The students are advised to contact NCC caretaker for the enrolment and other details.
- 5) **Rovers & Rangers:** The Bharat Scouts & Guides is a registered Society under Societies Registration Act. It is a voluntary, non-political and secular organization. It is the largest youth movement. College also intends to organize units of Rovers & Rangers activities under the leadership of faculty of the college. The objective of the units is to engender in each student qualities of personal dignity, poise, graciousness and social maturity.
- 6) **Career Counseling and Placement Cell (CCPC):** It is formed to help the students in providing the information for the selection of career and job placement through various Government and Private Agencies and to arrange the lectures by the experts and concerned officials for selection of better and suitable careers.
- 7) **Internal Complaints Committee/ Women Cell:** On the direction of Hon'ble Supreme Court of India, the college has established a women cell to redress grievances related to gender bias.
- 8) **Road Safety Club:** Road safety club is established in the college from the session 2021-22 with the purpose to aware the students and public regarding the traffic rules and road safety through various activities.
- 9) **Anti-Drug Cell:** The purpose of this club is:
  - To ensure drug free campus.
  - To educate and aware youth about the dangers of drug abuse.

- To motivate the students to actively participate in awareness programmes conducted by the cell.

**10) Mentor-Mentee Groups:** Mentor –Mentee system in our college has been specifically designed in order to promote an environment of personal guidance and care for every student. Mentees look to the mentor as an experienced guide, knowledgeable friend, trusted professional and as an advisor who can help them develop personal skills or competencies that will help them achieve personal and career goals. Every student of the college will be the member of one of mentor- mentee groups. This regular interaction with the mentees fosters trust and the students feel valued and supported during their academic journey.

**11) Parent Teacher Association (PTA):** The College has constituted the Parents Teachers Association w.e.f. session 2015-16. Every student is supposed to contribute Rs. 400/-p.a. towards PTA.

**12)Old Student Association (OSA):** OSA has been constituted in the college and the pass out students can become the member of OSA. One of the main purposes of alumni associations is to support and build the sense of belongingness among members of the alumni, the present students, and the staff with the common goal of all round development.

**13)Scholarships:** There are various provisions to grant scholarships in various categories to the deserving students as per the rules /directions issued by the state government from time to time. The few important categories are as follows: 1. IRDP, 2. SC/ST-it is restricted to certain income levels as applicable by the order of H.P. Govt. and 3. Brilliant students' scholarship of H.P. This scholarship is available only for those students who fulfill the following requirements: A) He/she should be a bonafide resident of Himachal Pradesh. B) He/she should have passed plus two examinations from HP Board.

### **College Library:**

The college was institutionalized in June 2014 and the college possesses a well-equipped library where essential books related to syllabi, general interest, competitive exams and reference books have been stacked. The students can visit the library and can get these books issued as per the time slots allotted to various classes. However, college library has got an adequate seating

capacity with proper furniture so that students may read the books in the library itself during their free classes. The library is also equipped with computers and Wi-Fi connection so that students may refer to online books and resources. Adjacent to the library, we have a reading room in which students may read various newspapers, magazines and journals subscribed by the college.

All the students are required to adhere to the following Library rules strictly:

1. All the students on the rolls of the College shall be eligible to become members of the College library.
2. Every student is entitled to draw two books for reading at home for a period of 14 days from the library.
3. The borrower shall be solely responsible for the safety/ preservation of the books taken by him/her.
4. A fine of Re.1/-per day per book will be charged beyond the due date of return of the book from the defaulter students.
5. In case a book is found mutilated, torn, defaced or misplaced the actual cost of the book plus 20% of the original cost will be charged from such defaulting students.
6. Reference books are to be consulted in the library only after obtaining permission from the Librarian.
7. The College also operates a book bank from which textbooks are loaned to poor students of all categories based on a nominal security, (i.e., actual cost plus 20% and maintenance charge of Rs.2/-per book).

*Note: Students can get their library security refunded within one year after leaving the College failing which the same will stand forfeited.*

## **CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE IN COLLEGE CAMPUS:**

The Principal can impose fine, suspension or even rustication on any student who is found indulging in such misconduct as is listed below. Indiscipline on campus will not be tolerated at all.

1. Any act of ragging in the campus will be severely dealt with. Ragging implies harassment: physical, mental torture to another student or group of students. Any student found associated with such nefarious/ immoral activities will be held guilty of gross misconduct. Remember- Ragging is a cognizable offence.

2. Anybody found guilty of writing obscene language/ words on blackboards, walls or furniture of the college.
3. Aimlessly loitering in the verandas, raising noise or attempting to disturb classes.
4. Smoking or taking alcohol/ drugs etc. in the college campus.
5. Any attempt to damage the furniture or other property in the campus.
6. Bringing unwanted outsiders to the campus or sitting unnecessarily in the passage.
7. Pasting posters on the walls or notices on the Notice-Board without the Principal's permission.
8. Students who participate in sports or other curricular activities/ educational tours must produce written permission from parents.

**Every student must always carry with him/her duly completed Identity Card which is issued to him/her at the time of admission. She/he must produce the Identity card whenever demanded by any teacher or the principal. Parents are requested to remain in touch with the principal and the concerned teachers regarding the progress of their wards in the college.**

### **RAGGING IS A CRIMINAL OFFENCE**

Ragging is a punishable offence. Ragging of all kind is strictly banned in the Govt. College Sarahan campus. Anybody caught indulging in this evil exercise shall face penalty under the law. Act remotely suggestive of ragging should be reported to the college authorities or to the member of anti-ragging committee. A student who commits the offence of ragging shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term, which may extend to three years or shall also be liable to a fine, which may extend to Rs. 50,000 or both.

In order to have zero tolerance and its total elimination from the educational institutions Hon'ble Supreme Court of India vide its orders dated 4th May, 2001; 16th May, 2007 and 11th Feb, 2009 has directed as under: - Ragging is banned in the institution. Anyone indulging in ragging is liable to be punished appropriately. Punishment shall be exemplary and justifiably harsh.

#### **Punishment for ragging includes:**

- Imprisonment, fine or both.
- Expulsion from the institution, suspension from the institution or classes for a limited period or fine with a public apology.
- Withholding scholarship or other benefits.
- Debarring from representation in events.
- Withholding of results.
- Suspension of expulsion from hostel or mess and the like

## ACADEMIC PROGRAMMES AVAILABLE IN THE COLLEGE

The college provides Three Year UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMME in two streams:

- 1) Bachelor of Arts (Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary)
- 2) Bachelor of Commerce (Pass Course)

The programmes are being run in accordance with HP University guidelines and directions of the state government.

### 1. Framework for Three Year Undergraduate Degree Programme under NEP 2020

The semester system is being introduced in a phased manner in UG colleges of Himachal Pradesh w.e.f. academic session 2026-27 under NEP 2020.

### Curricular and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programme (UGC-CCFUGP)

The UG curriculum consists of the following components:

#### i. Major Stream Courses

These are the disciplines or subjects of primary focus that provide students with the opportunity to pursue in-depth study of a particular discipline or subject, and the degree will be awarded in that discipline. Students should secure at least 50% of the total credits in the major discipline. All major courses will be of **4 credits** each.

#### ii. Minor Stream Courses

Minor courses help students gain a broader understanding beyond the major disciplines. Students will have the option to choose other disciplinary/interdisciplinary courses and skill-based courses relating to a chosen vocational education programme as a minor. Students who take the prescribed number of courses in a discipline or interdisciplinary area of study other than the chosen major will qualify for a minor in that discipline or the chosen multidisciplinary area of study. All minor courses will also be of **4 credits** each.

#### iii. Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary Courses

All students are required to undergo three introductory-level courses relating to any of the following broad disciplines. These courses are intended to broaden the intellectual experience and form part of liberal arts and science education. Students may be encouraged to choose courses that they have not taken at the higher secondary level under this category. Various departments will offer Multidisciplinary Courses. This must be distinct from the core discipline/subject. All courses under the multidisciplinary category will be **3 credits** each.

- a) **Commerce and Management:** Courses include business management, accountancy, finance, financial institutions, and more.
- b) **Humanities and Social Sciences:** The courses related to Social Sciences and humanities, for example, History, Linguistics, Political Science, Geography, Comparative Literature, Arts & Creative expressions, Creative Writing and Literature, language(s), and Sociology, will enable students to understand individuals and their social behaviour, society, and nation. The list of courses, which can include interdisciplinary subjects such as Cognitive Science, Environmental Science, Gender Studies, Global Environment and Health, International Relations, Political Economy and Development, Sustainable Development, and Women's and Gender Studies, will help understand the complexities of society.

iv. **Ability Enhancement Courses (Language and Communication Skill Courses)**

Students are required to achieve competency in Modern Indian Language (MIL) and in the English language, with special emphasis on language and communication skills. The courses aim to enable students to acquire and demonstrate the core linguistic skills, including critical reading and expository and academic writing skills, which help them articulate their arguments and present their thinking clearly and coherently, and recognise the importance of language as a mediator of knowledge and identity. They would also enable students to become acquainted with the cultural and intellectual heritage of the chosen MIL and the English language, as well as to gain a reflective understanding of the structure and complexity of the language/literature related to both the MIL and the English language. The courses will also emphasise the development and enhancement of skills such as communication and the ability to participate in/conduct discussions and debates. The courses under this category will be assigned **2 credits** each.

v. **Skill Enhancement Courses**

These courses are designed to impart practical skills, hands-on training, and soft skills to enhance the employability of students. Courses will be designed according to the students' needs and available institutional resources. Each of the Skill Enhancement courses will be assigned **3 credits**.

vi. **Value-Addition Courses**

These are courses common to all UG students. All UG students are required to take the following courses under the category of value-added courses. Each course under this category will be of **2 credits**.

- a) **Universal Human Values:** This introductory level course aims at helping the students to become more aware of themselves and their surroundings (family, society and nature). The course is also expected to help the students become more responsible in life and in handling problems with sustainable solutions while keeping human relationships and human nature in mind.
- b) **Understanding India:** The course aims to enable students to acquire and demonstrate knowledge and understanding of contemporary India, including its historical perspective, the basic framework of national development goals and policies, and constitutional obligations, with special emphasis on constitutional values and fundamental rights and duties. The course would also focus on developing an understanding among student-teachers of Indian knowledge systems, the Indian education system, and the roles and obligations of teachers to the nation in general and to the school/community/society. The course will attempt to deepen knowledge about and understanding of India's freedom struggle and of the values and ideals that it represented to develop an appreciation of the contributions made by people of all sections and regions of the country, and help learners understand and cherish the values enshrined in the Indian Constitution and to prepare them for their roles and responsibilities as effective citizens of a democratic society.
- c) **Environmental Science / Education:** The course seeks to equip students with the ability to apply the acquired knowledge, skills, attitudes, and values required to take appropriate actions for mitigating the effects of environmental degradation, climate change, and pollution, effective waste management, conservation of biological diversity, management of biological resources, forest and wildlife conservation, and sustainable development and living. The course will also deepen the knowledge and understanding of India's environment in its totality, its interactive processes, and its effects on the future quality of people's lives.

- d) **Digital and Technological Solutions:** Courses in cutting-edge areas that are fast gaining prominence, such as Artificial Intelligence (AI), 3-D machining, big data analysis, machine learning, drone technologies, and Deep learning with critical applications to health, environment, and sustainable living that will be woven into undergraduate education for enhancing the employability of the youth.
- e) **Health & Wellness, Yoga Education, Sports, and Fitness:** Course components related to health and wellness aim to promote an optimal state of physical, emotional, intellectual, social, spiritual, and environmental well-being in a person. Sports and fitness activities will be organised outside the regular institutional working hours. Yoga education would focus on preparing the students physically and mentally for the integration of their physical, mental, and spiritual faculties, and equipping them with basic knowledge about their personality, maintaining self-discipline and self-control, to learn to handle themselves well in all life situations. The focus of sports and fitness components of the courses will be on the improvement of physical fitness, including the improvement of various components of physical and skills-related fitness like strength, speed, coordination, endurance, and flexibility; acquisition of sports skills, including motor skills, as well as basic movement skills relevant to a particular sport; improvement of tactical abilities; and improvement of mental abilities.

vii. **Internship/Apprenticeship/Field Project**

A key aspect of the new NEP UG programme is induction into actual work situations or community experience. Each of the courses under the categories of Internship/Apprenticeship/Field Project, Community Engagement / Field-based Learning / Minor Project will be **4 credits**.

- a) **Internship/Apprenticeship:** All students will undergo internships/apprenticeships in a firm, industry, or organisation or training in labs with faculty and researchers in their own or other HEIs/research institutions during the summer term. Students will be provided with opportunities for internships with local industry, business organisations, health and allied areas, local governments (such as panchayats, municipalities), Parliament or elected representatives, media organisations, artists, crafts persons, and a wide variety of organisations so that students may actively engage with the practical side of their learning and, as a by-product, further improve

their employability. Students who wish to exit after the first two semesters will undergo a 4-credit work-based learning/internship during the summer term to obtain a UG Certificate.

- b) **Community Engagement and Service:** The curricular component of 'Community Engagement and Service' aims to expose students to socio-economic issues in society, thereby supplementing theoretical learning with real-life experiences to generate solutions to pressing problems. This can be part of the activity to be undertaken during the summer term or a component of a major or minor course, depending on the major/minor discipline.
- c) **Field-based learning/minor project:** The field-based learning/minor project aims to provide students with opportunities to understand the diverse socio-economic contexts. It will strive to provide students with exposure to development-related issues in both rural and urban settings. It will provide students with opportunities to observe situations in both rural and urban contexts, and to study actual field situations related to socio-economic development. Students will be given opportunities to gain a first-hand understanding of the policies, regulations, organisational structures, processes, and programmes that guide the development process. They would have the chance to gain an understanding of the complex socio-economic problems in the community and innovative practices required to generate solutions to the identified problems. This may be a project for the summer term or a part of a major or minor course, depending on the subject of study.

viii. **Research Project/Dissertation**

Students choosing a 4-Year Bachelor's degree (Honours with Research) are required to take research projects/dissertations under the guidance of a faculty member. Students are expected to complete the Research Project/Dissertation in either the seventh or eighth semester. The research outcomes of their project work may be published in peer-reviewed journals, presented at conferences/seminars, or patented. Research Project / Dissertation will be of 12 credits (4 in VII Sem and 8 in VIII Sem).

ix. **Other Activities**

This component will include participation in activities related to the National Service Scheme (NSS), National Cadet Corps (NCC), adult education/literacy initiatives, mentoring school

students and other similar activities. Students may be encouraged to enroll in these activities regardless of whether they are credit-bearing or non-credit-bearing.

### 3. ELIGIBILITY FOR THE DEGREE

3.1. The semester system is being introduced in a phased manner in UG colleges of Himachal Pradesh w.e.f. academic session 2026-27 under NEP 2020. Under this system there are multiple entry and exit options.

- After completing 1<sup>st</sup> Year, exit option with **UG Certificate** after securing **44 credits** (\*with 4 credits of I/A/P/C/or work-based vocational course offered during winter/summer term), along with entry option to second year or third semester in Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary.
- After completing 2<sup>nd</sup> Year, exit option with **UG Diploma** after securing **86 credits** along with entry option to third year or fifth semester.
- After completing 3<sup>rd</sup> Year, award of 3Year Bachelor's Degree after completion of **128 credits**.

3.2 However, students studying under old system i.e. CBCS (i.e. 2<sup>nd</sup> Year and 3<sup>rd</sup> Year) A regular candidate shall have to undergo the prescribed course of study in a college affiliated to the H.P. University for a period not less than three academic years (and not more than five academic years), pass the examinations prescribed and fulfil such conditions that have been prescribed by HP University from time to time.

- There shall be no private or other category of students and the candidates shall be eligible for degree through regular mode only.
- For the degree (B.A./B.Com.) the student will have to accumulate a minimum of 132 successful credits (PASSED) of coursework over a minimum of three and maximum of five years from the date of admission.
- Provided that not more than three attempts will be allowed to pass a course.

#### 4. Choosing Study Courses under CBCS (Old system): -

4.1 B.A. with a particular subject would require a student to study Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) of that subject in the II & III Year.

4.2 The Generic Elective required to be offered in the III Year by the student will be other than the two Discipline Specific Courses already offered by the student.

## 5. Credits

The term 'credit' refers to the weightage given to a course, usually in terms of the number of instructional hours per week assigned to it. This explains why usually 'credit' is taken to mean 'Credit Hour'. The credit also determines the volume of course contents and delivery of programme such as lectures, tutorials, practical, assignments, etc.

**For purpose of credit determination, the instructions are divided into three components: -**

Lectures (L)- Classroom Lecture of One Hour Duration.

Tutorial (T)-Special, elaborate instruction on specific topics of one hour duration.

Practical (P)- Laboratory of field exercises in which the students must do experiments or other practical works of two-hour duration.

Each one of these components is considered as equal to one credit. One Lecture (L) as well as one Tutorial (T) is considered as one credit whereas one Practical (P) two hours is considered as one credit. So, in the form of symbols it can be written as  $C=L+T+P$  where C stands for credit.

## 6. Students' Course-wise Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) and Evaluation under CBCS:

All courses that are undertaken by a student involve an evaluation system that has the following two components.

- i. **Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA):** As per scheme of evaluation 30% of the final grade that the student gets in a course is through Internal Assessment.
- ii) **Term End Examination (TEE):** The remaining 70% of the final grade that the student gets in a course constitutes a Term End Examination.

**6.1 Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA):** This would have the following components.

**6.1.1 Classroom Attendance:** Each student will have to attend a minimum of 75% Lectures / Tutorial/Practical. A student having less than 75% attendance will not be allowed to appear in the Term End Examination. Those having greater than 75% attendance (for those participating in co-curricular activities e.g., NSS, NCC, Sports, Youth Festival, RRC etc. 25% will be added to percent attendance) will be awarded CCA marks as follows: - 75% but < 80%=1 marks: 80% but <85%= 2 marks, 85 but <90%= 3 marks, 90% but < 95%=4 marks, >95%=5 marks.

**6.1.2 Class Test:** There will be one class test for 5 marks after completion of at least 40% of syllabi of all courses opted by the student.

**6.1.3 Mid-Term Test:** There will also be one mid-term test for 10 Marks after completion of at least 75% of syllabi of all courses opted by the student.

**6.1.4 Seminar / Assignment / Term Paper:** The remaining 10 marks of the CCA will be awarded based on seminar/ Assignment / term paper, etc. that the teacher would give to students in respective disciplines.

**Grievances and Redressal Mechanism:** The students will have the right to make an appeal against any component of evaluation. Such appeal must be made to the Principal of the College on a prescribed form and should clearly state in writing the reasons(s) for the complaint / appeal. The appeal will be placed before the Grievances Redressal Committee (GRC), Chaired by the College Principal, composed of the Head of the Department, course Teacher, and a senior Teacher of the Department. The decision of the Committee will be final.

*For further details of CBCS, Term End Examination and for any modifications in scheme of programme obviously as per directions of HP University or Government of Himachal Pradesh, the students are advised to go through the notices displayed from time to time on the College Notice Board.*

## RULES FOR ADMISSION

1. The eligibility criteria for admission to BA/B.Com in the 1<sup>st</sup> Semester is strictly as per the latest ordinances/guidelines/calendar notified by the HP University/Government.
2. Candidates/parents/ guardians must read all instructions given in the prospectus carefully and submit application form complete in all respects online.
3. The candidate must fill up the particulars in the prescribed online admission form carefully.
4. Admission will be granted strictly on fulfilment of all eligibility conditions.
5. Any gap in the academic career of an applicant must be supported by a self-declared undertaking.
6. A student must produce original documents at the time of counselling.
7. Rules of admission are subject to change as per HPU notification from time to time.
8. Candidates coming from Boards / Universities other than HP Board of School Education, Dharamshala/HPU, Shimla, must produce a migration certificate in original.
9. A Candidate having compartment in 10+2 in any subject is not eligible for seeking admission in B.A. I /B.Com. I Year.
10. Admission of a candidate is liable to be cancelled if he/she furnishes incomplete / false information or in case of concealment of facts. Disciplinary action will be taken against such candidates.
11. Girl students seeking admission in any class must bring an attested copy of **HP Bonafide Certificate** to avail fee concession.
12. Principal of the college has the power to refuse or terminate the admission, if the conduct of a student during his or her stay in the college is unsatisfactory.
13. Students seeking exemption from tuition fee on the ground of special ability must attach the certificate issued by the medical board.
14. Only those candidates who have passed all the five papers including English from National Open School are eligible.
15. Candidates' ineligible for Admission:
  - A) A candidate having a compartment in any subject at 10+2 level.
  - B) A candidate who has been expelled or rusticated from any other institution.
16. Initially all the admission will be provisional (i.e., subject to approval by HPU).

17. A student can migrate from one college to another in accordance with the rules laid down by Himachal Pradesh University.

**Application form must be completed in all respects along with following documents:**

- A) **Original Character Certificate** from the institution last attended for regular students.
- B) **Original Character-Certificate** from the 1st class Magistrate/Gazetted Government Officer/Panchayat Pradhan, for others.
- C) Attested copy of detailed marks card of the previous examination passed.
- D) Attested copy of matriculation examination certificate in support of date of birth.
- E) **Original migration certificate** (in case of examination passed from Board/ University other than HP).
- F) **SC/ST certificate** issued by first class magistrate.
- G) Self- declaration undertaking of gap year if any, after passing 10+2.

**Eligibility for Admission in B.A./ B.Com. 1<sup>st</sup> Year:**

1. **Age limit:** Maximum age limit for admission to B.A./B.Com. First Year is 23 years for boys and 25 years for girls as on July 1, 2026 (Chapter 3, 3.3.A of University Ordinance). For SC/ST candidates a relaxation of three years in the upper age limit is permissible. The Vice Chancellor of HPU may, in exceptional cases/ circumstances, to be recorded in writing, give relaxation in age up to a maximum of six months to any candidate. All such cases of age relaxation of up to six months may be granted admission provisionally by principal and a consolidated list of all such cases will be sent to the Vice Chancellor for necessary approval. Relaxation in upper age is also available to especially abled candidates.
2. The candidates who have passed five subjects including English in 10+2 examination are eligible for the admission.

**RESERVATION OF SEATS (Ordinance 3.14)** 15%, 7.5% and 3% of the seats shall be reserved for S.C., S.T. & especially abled candidates respectively as per H.P. University 120 seats roster norms. This reservation will be applicable to those candidates who have passed their qualifying examination from H.P. Board of School Education or from School affiliated to any

board but located within territorial Jurisdiction of Himachal Pradesh and must be bonafide of Himachal Pradesh. For reservation, the following roster will be followed: -

**IDENTITY CARD**

It is mandatory for every student to carry his/her college identity card while in college. The identity card must be produced by the student whenever it is demanded by the college authorities. Replacement of Photo in the Identity card is not permitted under any circumstances whatsoever. In case the identity card is lost, one must file an FIR to get a duplicate identity card on payment of Rs. 20/- (within one week only).

**LEAVE RULES:**

1. Students can proceed on leave with prior permission. For this they must get leave allowed by the subject in charge and approved by the principal on a written application. After the approval from the principal, students should bring it to the Course In charge of the respective subjects opted by the student. Students must retain one photocopy of the approved application and submit the approved original copy of the leave application to the office of college superintendent.
2. Leave during House examination will be sanctioned by the principal on the recommendation of the senior tutor.
3. Leave for Sickness/medical grounds must be accompanied by a medical Certificate.
4. A student will not be allowed to avail more than 10 days leave during the entire academic session, except under exceptional circumstances.
5. If a student remains absent for 7 days continuously without information, his/her name will be struck off from the rolls of the College.
6. Even if a student is on leave, he/she will have to deposit his/her fee as per the scheduled dates decided by the College.
7. **Re-admission:** Students can seek readmission twice during the session. First re-admission will be allowed within 7 days after the name is struck on paying a fine of Rs 100/- and a fine of Rs 200/- will be charged for the second readmission within 5 days after the name is struck off from the rolls.
